NEW COURSES - FALL 1979

113 Administrative Law (Required) Mr. Collins (3)

A study of practice in the administrative process, examining the procedures for administrative adjudication and rulemaking; legislative and judicial control of administrative action; and public access to governmental processes and information.

415 The Federal Courts I Mr. Walker (3)

A study of the jurisdiction of the United States courts, trial and appellate, and the role of these courts in the federal system; specific topics include the case and controversy doctrine; diversity of citizenship; cases arising under the Constitution, laws and treaties of the United States; jurisdictional amount; removal jurisdiction and procedure; venue; and procedure in the federal district and appellate courts.

424 Environmental Law Mr. Smith (3)

A study of the nature and causes of environmental pollution, and of the main statutory techniques for its control. Topics covered will include the basic regulatory frameworks for water, air and solid waste control (the Federal Clean Water Act, Clean Air Act and Resource Conservation and Recovery Act), with attention given, under each statute, to new developments in administrative law (including current efforts at administrative law reform), toxic and hazardous substance regulation, enforcement, and judicial review.

452 Law and Ethics Mr. Schaefer / Mr. Fuchs (3)

An experimental course, jointly taught by a member of the law faculty and a member of the philosophy department. The course will include an introduction to contemporary theories of law and ethics; a comparison of the approaches of philosophers and of the legal system to selected problems in constitutional law and in such areas of private law as torts and contracts; and a consideration of the ethical framework of the proposed revision of the Code of Professional Responsibility. Enrollment will be limited to fifteen law students and fifteen undergraduate students.

Prerequisite: Phil./Gov./ 310 or consent of instructor.

500 Intensive Legal Writing Mr. Gordon (2)

Although relying heavily on written communication, many lawyers write poorly. This intensive course is designed to help students write clearly. Assignments will include drafting contracts, leases, pleadings and other legal instruments.

Grades will be based on rigorous weekly drafting exercises.

552 Sex Discrimination Ms. Butler (3)

This seminar will begin with an analysis of the constitutional and statutory principles governing sex discrimination cases and then will examine how the legal principles have been applied in such areas as employment, education, criminal law, domestic relations and sports. All students will be expected to submit a research paper analyzing how a specific sex discrimination problem should be resolved.

Prerequisite: Constitutional Law

717 Advanced Individual Income Tax

Mr. Halliday (2)

Selected provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of particular interest to individual taxpayers will be considered. Special attention will be given to taxation of earned income including current employee benefits, income averaging and the maximum tax; tax shelters including real estate, oil and gas, recapture, at risk, front-end expenses; hobby-loss provisions, investment interest and the minimum tax; energy and investment tax credits; deferred and private annuities, tax-exempt bonds, and short-term trusts; business use of home, rental of a vacation home, travel and entertainment expenses; alimony, child support, and the childcare credit; utilization of foreign source income to reduce U.S. taxes; and tax-free exchanges.
