The business conducted at the annual meeting included the adoption of the two proposed amendments to the Constitution, one of which permits a single slate of nominees for office instead of requiring two nominees for each office as in the past, and the other automatically places the retiring President on the Board of Directors for a term of three years, both effective in 1959.

Justice Willis D. Miller's reminiscences and comments on practice before the Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals were thoroughly enjoyed by those who attended the annual luncheon.

This year's annual meeting received the largest attendance of the six to date. We hope you will do your part to make next year's Seventh even larger. Professor Atkeson has accepted an appointment to set up a new research organization for the Internal Revenue Service. The following is quoted from the official announcement:

"Commissioner Russell C. Harrington announced from Washington, D. C. today that the new unit will be known as the Planning and Research Office and that it will be headed by an Assistant Commissioner of Internal Revenue.

"The Commissioner said he has prevailed upon Dr. Thomas C. Atkeson, professor of taxation at the College of William and Mary in Virginia, to select and initiate the first series of research and development projects.

"Dr. Atkeson has agreed to undertake the work on a consultant basis for the next few months."

The College is pleased that Dr. Atkeson has again been afforded an unique opportunity to serve the Americal people in the Internal Revenue Service's never ending job of improving tax administration.

Judge H. Lester Hooker, Chairman of the State Corporation Commission, was the guest speaker at the semiannual initiation-installation banquet of the Phi Alpha Delta Law Fraternity held on the evening of May 10. Judge Hooker delivered a scholarly, informative and interesting address on the history and functions of the State Corporation Commission.

Professor Curtis represented the Law School at the annual meeting of the American Law Institute held in Washington on May 23rd and 24th. Professor James P. Whyte, as a representative of the Law School and the local Bar, explained the role of law in present day society to High School classes in Williamsburg as our contribution to "Law Day - U. S. A."
