I know that my experience wasn't exactly how it could've been without the pandemic, and I wasn't able to experience things as simple as in-person classes; however I am happy with the effort that was put in by William & Mary instructors and students to make the best out of the situation we'd been dealt.

Throughout orientation week I was told that this school was self-selecting in the way that it attracted students and faculty who really appreciated working together rather than creating an environment where everyone is seen as competition. By the end of my first semester I had seen that statement come to light a number of times. I do still believe (as presented by the demographics of our student body and individual classes) William & Mary is horribly lacking in the department of a racially diverse student body. With that in mind, student organizations such as BLSA helped me meet incredible people who were able to show me the ropes and give me a helping hand whenever it was needed. By the time my first semester ended I had met multiple people who I could call my friends and lean on for help and support.

Even beyond my experiences with other students, I actually felt connected to the instructors. Professors were able to keep classes engaged and reached out to the students for feedback on their lessons on multiple occasions. The professors created an environment in which I was happy to learn and struggle with the subject matter in order to truly grasp what I had been reading. I certainly struggled over course material throughout the semester, and what helped me was going to office hours or TA office hours. My specific instructors and TA's were happy to help me get through any rough patches I encountered while studying, and it made learning the

information easier. Some professors even created certain socially distanced events where we could get to know them better because of the pandemic. This had nothing to do with coursework, but was a great way by the professors to keep the sense of community that attracted so many of us to William & Mary. I know the 1Ls as a whole truly appreciated those opportunities.

For the spring semester and beyond I am hoping that I am able to take what I learned this semester and apply it to next semester in order to create a routine that best supports learning through Zoom.
