The St. George Tucker Lecture Series was established in 1996 to recognize the scholarly achievements of senior members of the William & Mary Law School faculty. The series has been made possible through the generosity of Law School alumni.

Aaron-Andrew Bruhl joined the Law School in 2015. He received his J.D. degree from Yale Law School and holds a master's degree in political theory from the University of Cambridge.

After law school, Professor Bruhl clerked for Chief Judge Carolyn Dineen King on the United States Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit. He then worked as a litigation associate in the Washington DC office of Jenner & Block LLP. His work focused on federal appellate litigation and included cases involving election law, the First Amendment, federal Indian law, and copyright infringement over online peer-to-peer file-sharing services.

Professor Bruhl previously taught at the University of Houston Law Center and served as a visiting professor at the University of Texas School of Law. He is a recipient of the Plumeri Award for Faculty Excellence for 2017.
