The civil case competition takes place annually in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and features top

competition from law schools throughout the Mid-Atlantic and Midwest regions. Additionally, Michelle won Best Overall Advocate, and Jessica received the Second Place Oral Advocate award in the tournament.

Also in late February, a team consisting of Andrew English, Kia King, Brooke Williams, and Amrbia Witt placed third overall in the regional Thurgood Marshall BLSA Mock Trial Competition in Philadelphia, PA, earning them a spot at Nationals.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING BAR APPLICATIONS:

OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPTS - Some state bars require official transcripts as part of the application process. The Law School **DOES NOT** provide official transcripts. The University Registrar's office provides these upon submission of a written request and a payment of \$5.00 per copy.

FINGERPRINTS - Many state bar applications require submission of the applicant's fingerprints. Beginning immediately, Kay Hibbard, in the reception area, will be setting up appointments for students wishing to have their fingerprints done by Campus Police. Appointments are available between the hours of **7:00-8:00 a.m.** and **4:00-5:00 p.m. ONLY**, Monday through Friday. All appointments are scheduled for the following week. There is no charge for this. For those taking the Virginia Bar, a Virginia Bar Application fingerprint card can be obtained from Kay Hibbard, Gloria Todd or Chris Creech. Of course, you can also go to any police station to have this done. Be sure to take a photo id with you for this appointment.

NOTARIZING THE APPLICATION - Most bar applications require you sign before a notary. Kay Hibbard, Gloria Todd, Chris Creech and Felicia Burton are notaries and will be glad to help you with this. **DO NOT SIGN ANY DOCUMENT TO BE NOTARIZED** until you are in front of a notary. Have all your documents/forms in order before you come in for notarization. This will greatly speed up the process!

FOR THOSE TAKING THE VIRGINIA BAR EXAM: Please remember to pick up the **EDUCATION CERTIFICATE** from Kay Hibbard, Gloria Todd or Chris Creech A good time to pick this up is when you come in to have your application notarized. This form <u>must</u> accompany your Virginia Bar Application.

The **VIRGINIA BAR CERTIFICATE OF GRADUATION** will be sent by Dean Jackson on **May 18**. And most important, make **YOUR deadline** for the application May 8. Please feel free to contact Chris Creech should you have any questions.

VIRGINIA BAR UPDATE - The Application for the Virginia Bar Examination and the Applicant's Character and Fitness Questionnaire are available online through the Virginia Board of Bar Examiners web site at: <u>http://www.vbbe.state.va.us/forms.html</u> Students who expect to sit for the Virginia Bar Examination can file the Character and Fitness Questionnaire within the first 14 months of their law school career for a discounted rate. The Bar Application itself cannot be filed more than three months prior to sitting for the exam.

Those planning to sit for the Virginia Bar are forewarned that the Virginia Board of Bar Examiners requires applicants to take the Multi-state Professional Responsibility Examination (MPRE). The MPRE is a fifty question, two-hour, multiple-choice examination administered three times each year. You can register online at http://www.ncbex.org/tests/mpre/mpre.htm. GOOD LUCK!!!

WOMEN AND ISLAMIC LAW ACTIVIST TO GIVE TWO LECTURES AT WILLIAM & MARY ON MARCH 16 and 17 - Zainah Anwar, a founding member and former Executive Director of Sisters in Islam, and the Reves Center's First Annual Kraemer Distinguished Scholar of Islamic Law and Governance, will present two lectures on Monday, March 16, and Tuesday, March 17, at the College of William & Mary. The lectures are sponsored by the Reves Center for International Studies and the Program in Comparative Legal Studies and Post-Conflict Justice. Anwar will present the first lecture, titled "What Islam, Whose Islam? From Misogyny to Equality," on Monday, March 16, at 5:00 p.m. in the Commonwealth Auditorium of the Sadler Center on the College's undergraduate campus. She will present her second lecture, titled "Challenging History and Tradition: Women and Islamic Law," on Tuesday, March 17, at 5:00 p.m. in Room 127 at William & Mary Law School. Both events are free and the public is welcome.

The Honorable H. Robert Mayer of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit will deliver the **2008-09 STANLEY H. MERVIS LECTURE** in Intellectual Property on Wednesday, March 18. The lecture, titled "The Evolution of the Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit," will be held at 12:50 p.m. in Room 127 of the Law School. Admission is free, and all are welcome.

Judge Mayer earned his undergraduate degree at West Point and entered William & Mary Law School after serving with great distinction in the U.S. Army during the Vietnam War. He served as editor-in-chief of the *William and Mary Law Review* and graduated first in his law school class. After graduation Judge Mayer clerked for Judge John D. Butzner, Jr., of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fourth Circuit and was later special assistant to Chief Justice Warren E. Burger of the Supreme Court. He practiced law at McGuire, Woods & Battle in Charlottesville, Va., and Baker & McKenzie in Washington, DC, while also finding time to teach as an adjunct law professor at the University of Virginia and George Washington University. President Reagan appointed him to what is now the U.S. Court of Federal Claims in 1982 and then to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit in 1987. Judge Mayer served as Chief Judge of the Federal Circuit from 1997 to 2004.

The Stanley H. Mervis Lectureship in Intellectual Property was created in memory of Stanley Mervis in 2003 by his family and friends. Mervis, a member of the William & Mary Law School Class of 1950, was patent counsel for Polaroid Corporation for most of his career and was actively involved in important patent and intellectual property issues.

March 1 is the deadline for returning students to file the FAFSA located at fafsa.ed.gov. William & Mary's Title IV Federal School Code is 003705. **IMPORTANT NOTE:** Law school financial aid is awarded and packaged based on residency status for each student. Aid initially awarded to out-of-state students reclassified as instate students must go through the re-award process. Students are responsible for notifying Dean Faye Shealy if they apply for and obtain in-state status for the coming academic year.

DRI Diversity Scholarship – Two \$10,000 scholarships are open to incoming second and thirdyear African American, Hispanic, Asian, Pan Asian and Native American students. There are several **Fellowship Programs** that provide stipends of up to \$3,600 for students who secure summer internships with employers who are unable to provide funding or can only provide partial funding. The availability of funds through William & Mary enhances your candidacy with employers. There is a one-page handout available on the display racks in OCS that describes William & Mary's various Fellowship Programs for the summer of 2009. Please feel free to include this flier with your resumes and

cover letters to government and public service employers. In your cover letter, you may want to indicate that "William & Mary has several public interest [or government] summer funding sources, as detailed on the enclosed sheet." The application process for these fellowships is very competitive, and you must have a written offer of employment in order to apply for funding. The **application deadline for funding is Friday, March 27 at 5:00 p.m.**

For 3Ls: Post-Graduate Public Service Fellowships are designed to provide a "bridge" between when you take the bar and when the bar results are announced since many permanent jobs aren't filled until the bar results are published. Students who would like to work during that time for a government agency or public interest organization and have not yet secured post-graduate employment are eligible to apply for this fellowship.

There is no application deadline to apply for post-graduate fellowships; however, they are being allocated on a rolling basis as of March 1. In order to secure funding, students first need to secure an offer for a position in a government agency or public interest organization. This information is posted on a bulletin board in OCS and in OCS Resources for Students on Blackboard. In addition to the intellectual and often economic benefits of these contests, the competitions are another way for you to demonstrate your legal writing abilities to employers. Because they are often sponsored by bar associations and other professional groups, they also provide excellent networking opportunities. Keep in mind that faculty members are a good source of ideas and guidance if you decide to participate. We have recently posted information regarding the following writing competitions:

The *ABA Section of Real Property, Trust and Estate Law* has announced its **Annual Writing Competition** for the section's scholarly publication, the Real Property, Trust and Estate Law Journal. The competition is open to all law and LL.M students attending an ABA accredited law school, and encourages high quality writing on real property and trust and estate law topics of general and current interest. The first place winner will receive a cash award of \$2,500; second and third place winners will receive \$1,500 and \$1,000 respectively. The deadline for submitting papers is June 19, 2009.
