**LAN CAO**, who arrives in January, will be our leader in the area of private international law, teaching courses in international business transactions, international trade, and international economic development. Lan went to college at Mount Holyoke (Phi Beta Kappa) and law school at Yale (Notes Editor of the Journal). After clerking for Judge Motley (S.D.N.Y.), she practiced law at Paul Weiss in New York City, before beginning to teach. Her publications include articles in *Law and Contemporary Problems*, *Notre Dame Law Review*, *Texas International Law Journal*, *New York University Journal of International Law & Policy*; and *Brooklyn Journal of International Law*. She has also written a highly acclaimed novel, *Monkey Bridge*. Currently, she has a novel-in-progress (under contract with Viking for publication in 2001).

**JOHN DUFFY** brings significant expertise in intellectual property, administrative law and regulated industries. After graduating from Harvard, John received his law degree from the University of Chicago (Order of the Coif and Articles Editor of the Review). John clerked for Justice Scalia at the United States Supreme Court, following a clerkship on the D.C. Circuit with Judge Williams. He practiced law at the Justice Department and Covington & Burling. John's publications include articles in the *University of Colorado Law Review*, *Journal of Law & Policy*, *Texas Law Review*, and *Columbia Law Review*. His article in the *Texas Law Review* won the 1999 Annual Scholarship Award from the ABA Section on Administrative Law and Regulatory Practice. John currently is working on the third edition of *Patent Law and Policy* with Robert Patrick Merges (U.C. Berkeley).

**JIM DWYER** has taught and written extensively about family law and children's rights. He received his B.A. from Boston College (Phi Beta Kappa), his J.D. from Yale, and his Ph.D. in philosophy from Stanford. Jim practiced law in Washington, D.C., at Coudert Brothers and Sutherland, Asbill, and also in Albany, New York, representing children in family courts. His publications include a book on children's rights from Cornell University Press and articles in the *William and Mary Law Review*, *Notre Dame Law Review*, *Santa Clara Law Review*, *North Carolina Law Review*, and *California Law Review*. Jim recently completed a second book on school vouchers and has begun a third book on children's relationship rights.

**RICHARD HYNES** is a “first time” teacher interested in consumer and corporate finance, contracts, corporations, and law and economics. After receiving a B.S.F.S. from Georgetown (Phi Beta Kappa), he earned a J.D. from the University of Chicago (Order of the Coif) and a Ph.D. in economics from the University of Pennsylvania. Rich practiced at Skadden, Arps in Los Angeles before coming to William & Mary. His publications include an article in the *Journal of Law and Economics*. He is currently working on two articles involving the regulation of consumer finance.

**MICHAEL STEIN** is a well-recognized scholar in the area of disability law. He has a B.A. from New York University (Phi Beta Kappa), a J.D. from Harvard (Book Review & Comments Editor of the Review), and a Ph.D. in legal history from Cambridge.
