

WE'RE VERY PLEASED TO WELCOME THREE NEW MEMBERS TO THE LAW SCHOOL FACULTY THIS FALL. For the overly-precise, only one of these professors is truly new: Timothy Zick. Professor Larry Palmer joined us last spring, and Professor Patty Roberts has been a non-faculty member of our community for about a decade, and a visiting faculty member this past academic year.

Professor Zick comes to William & Mary Law after teaching for six years at St. Johns Law School in New York. He is a *summa cum laude* graduate of Georgetown University Law Center, ranked first in his class (the original, and true meaning of *summa*). He then worked as an associate at Williams & Connolly in D.C., and later at Foley Hoag in Boston. He served as a law clerk to the Honorable Levin H. Campbell of the United States Court of Appeals for the First Circuit. Professor Zick also served as a Trial Attorney in the Federal Programs Branch of the United States Department of Justice, where he defended the constitutionality and legality of a variety of federal programs and statutes.

Professor Zick has written on a wide variety of constitutional issues, with a special focus on issues of free speech and federalism. His articles have been published in the Texas Law Review, the Washington University Law Review, the William & Mary Law Review, and the George Washington Law Review. His forthcoming book, "Speech Out of Doors: Preserving First Amendment Liberties in Public Places," (Cambridge University Press) examines the dynamic intersection of place and the First Amendment.

Professor Zick will be teaching Torts in the fall, and Constitutional Law in the spring. He is by all reports a superior teacher; some lucky 1Ls may get to take two of his courses.

Professor Larry Palmer came to the Law School this past spring. In addition to serving on our faculty, he is the director of our Health Policy and Law Initiative with Virginia Commonwealth University. Prior to arriving in Williamsburg, Professor Palmer taught for four years at the University of Louisville. He spent the first 27 years of his academic career as a law professor, vice president, and vice provost at Cornell University.

Professor Palmer has published extensively on health care and medical ethics. He is also the executive producer and author of the study guide of the prize-winning educational video "Susceptible to Kindness: Miss Evers' Boys and the Tuskegee Syphilis Study."

In the fall, he will teach Legislation, and in the spring of '09 he will teaching Selected Topics in Health Care Law.

Last but far from least, **Professor Patricia Roberts** has moved from the administration to the faculty. After serving as a visiting faculty member last year, Professor Roberts was appointed to the full-time faculty as a Clinical Assistant Professor of Law. She is one of our own, having graduated from the Law School in 1992. After graduating from law school, Professor Roberts practiced law in Newport News, Va., as a sole practitioner and later as a managing partner of a civil practice law firm. In 1997, she began teaching in the Legal Skills Program and since 2000 has served in numerous administrative roles including Associate Director of the Legal Skills Program, Director of the Academic Support Program and Externship Program, and Associate Dean for Academic Programs.

As Director of Clinical Programs, Professor Roberts responsibilities include the development of new clinic initiatives. Among them, she is developing a Veterans Disability Clinic, which will open its doors in January 2009 as part of the VCU W&M Health Policy and Law Initiative. Appellate litigation and special education advocacy clinics also are in the planning stage. She will continue to direct (and teach in) the Legal Skills Program.

In addition to her clinical teaching responsibilities, Professor Roberts will teach Legal Skills III in the fall and Legal Skills II in the spring.

THE LAW SCHOOL ALSO WELCOMES one of our Madrid faculty members, **Pablo Garcia Mexia**. Professor Mexia has taught in our Madrid program since 1997, and is a lecturer in Constitutional Law at Universidad Carlos III de Madrid. He received his LL.B. and Ph.D. from the Universidad Comptense de Madrid and his Diploma in English Law at the University of Kent. He was a Research Fellow at Harvard Law School, and, in addition to teaching law, is Letrado de las Cortes Generales (Legal Advisor to the Spanish Parliament). He is co-founder of *Syntagma, Center of Strategic Studies*, a private think-tank specializing in legal and good governance issues. Professor Mexia is an international consultant and has served as Secretary General of the Madrid Regional Parliament. Professor Mexia will teach a short course for the Law School on European Internet Law during the weeks of September 1st and 8th.

VIRGINIA BAR UPDATE - The Application for the Virginia Bar Examination and the Applicant's Character and Fitness Questionnaire are available online through the Virginia Board of Bar Examiners web site at: <http://www.vbbe.state.va.us/forms.html> Students who expect to sit for the Virginia Bar Examination can file the Character and Fitness Questionnaire within the first 14 months of their law school career for a discounted rate. The Bar Application, itself, cannot be filed more than three months prior to sitting for the exam.

Those planning to sit for the Virginia Bar are forewarned that the Virginia Board of Bar Examiners requires applicants to take the Multi-state Professional Responsibility Examination (MPRE).
