New Faculty

3Ls Equal Justice Works Equal Justice Fellowship applications are now being solicited. These two-year fellowships provide salary and loan repayment assistance to lawyers who advocate on behalf of individuals, groups, or interests that are not adequately represented by some aspect of the legal system. In addition to the intellectual and often monetary benefits of these contests, the competitions are another way for you to demonstrate your legal writing abilities to prospective employers. Because they are often sponsored by bar associations and other professional groups, they also provide excellent networking opportunities. Keep in mind that faculty members are a good source of ideas and guidance.

Affirmative Action The *National Black Law Journal-UCLA Edition* is accepting comments and articles for spring 2006 publication in the UCLA 35th Anniversary NBLJ issue. The work should address the African-American student's experience in legal education. Questions include but are not limited to the following: Has American legal education ever fully integrated the African-American experience into the classroom? What impact do social attitudes on race have on educational outcomes? Is the legal academic environment a vacuum or a microcosm of the various power and racial dynamics of the larger dominant society? What impact does internalized racism and the "stereotype threat" have on the education outcomes of African-Americans? **Deadline for submission is January 31, 2006.**

The **NRA Civil Rights Defense Fund** is sponsoring a writing contest, the subject of which is "The Right of the Individual to Keep and Bear Arms is a Federally Protected Right." Cash prizes will be awarded to First, Second, Third and Fourth place winners in the amounts of \$5,000, \$3,000, \$2,000 and \$1,000 respectively. **Entries must be postmarked on or before May 31, 2006.**

The **NRA Civil Rights Defense Fund** is awarding scholarships to current 3-Ls who submit articles of quality suitable for publication in a law review or journal on the constitutional right to keep and bear arms.
